A CHAT WITH OUR CEO

Why is Open the Book so crucial to Bible mission?

Open the Book (see pages 4 and 5) takes Bible storytelling into schools and in many ways is a perfect example of what Bible Society is all about.

It unites Christians of different denominations to work together, creating a trusted meeting place around the Bible. And at the centre of it all is being able to equip a new generation with a knowledge of the Bible. It is vital to make the Bible accessible to all ages in ways they can understand, and it's especially important that children have the chance to engage with the Scriptures.

The stories in the Bible have shaped a whole civilisation over thousands of years and we neglect them in society at our peril. They've inspired all kinds of social change and reform, and transformed people's lives on a personal level.

Through Open the Book, Bible stories can inspire school communities and parents – even those without a faith.

As Open the Book is a catalyst for change inspired and shaped by the Bible, so the programme exemplifies every dimension of Bible Society's strategy to grow people's confidence in the Bible and help change the conversation about the Bible in wider society.

Is it true you now know two kings on a personal level?

I'm not sure I would describe my meeting with King Charles III as getting to know him on a personal level [laughs]. I do, of course, have a personal relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only king that we really need to know. But it was a privilege to attend an Advent service and meet King Charles at the gathering arranged by Bible Society's President, Archbishop Angaelos of London. The king expressed an interest in our work, especially in the Middle East at this time, and he recognised the reconciliatory potential of the Bible.

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Guatemala has one of the highest murder rates in Latin America with 3,500 violent deaths each year, mainly through gang activity and drug trafficking disputes. Perhaps that is why so many children and young people are open to seeking Jesus. They yearn for hope and peace. And your support of the Open the Book ministry is providing it to them.

We arrive at a metal gate and hear a bolt being slowly drawn across on the inside. The gate creaks open and a lady welcomes us with a warm smile. 'Come on in,' she says.

Inside, we turn a corner and are met by the incredible sight of 600 children aged between 4 and 12 seated in a small stadium singing a gospel song.

This is an Open the Book session and the Bible story today is 'Free at Last'. A team of 14 Open the Book volunteers and 10 children act out the story of Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt.

Mixco Public School is in Tierra
Nueva, a dangerous slum area at
the northern tip of Guatemala
City, the capital. Crime is rampant
and some of these children have
already been recruited into gangs.
The volunteers tell us that the
children especially identify with
the Bible stories of overcoming
trials and obstacles. They listen
closely to how we can trust in God
and find hope and peace in Jesus.

Julianna, aged 8, who played an Egyptian girl in the story, tells us she wants to be a police officer when she is older so she can protect people. Her favourite story is Daniel 'because he bravely went into the lions den'.

Cristal enjoys Open the Book because, 'I learn about what is good and what is bad.' Rosita says she wants to be a pastor. Her favourite Bible passage is Genesis 1.1 because, 'We learn that God created the heavens and the Earth so we could come and live in it.' While Jennifer says, 'After hearing the Bible stories, I now know how to talk to God.' She adds that when she is older she wants to be a doctor so she can help people living on the streets.

The Open the Book session ends with a prayer and the children bow their heads and pray earnestly. 6

The children identify with the Bible stories of overcoming trials and obstacles. They listen closely to how we can trust in God and find hope and peace in Jesus."

Guatemala has a population of 19 million. Bible Society of Guatemala started running Open the Book in 2023 and already volunteers are taking the storytelling to 3,000 children at 6 schools. Bible storytelling teams also visit youth detention centres, young single mothers and schools for children with additional needs and physical disabilities. This is all supported by you here in England and Wales.

Pastor Juan Fidel Perez, aged 75, has been leading the local Rock of Salvation church in Tierra Nueva for 45 years. Over cups of the traditional Guatemalan drink, Atol de Platano (a plantain and milk drink) he says, 'Most young people don't go to church so without Open the Book we would not be able to reach out and speak to these children.'

He explains that half the families in Guatemala live below the

poverty line and a quarter of the population are illiterate. School drop-out rates are very high. He says the Open the Book volunteers are respected in the community. 'Pupils speak to them outside school and they provide vital support to families in need,' he says.

One of the volunteers, Adeley, joins us. 'When the children at the schools have sadness and difficulties in their life, now they can speak to God,' she says.



In HMP Stocken, a category C prison, there's a loud knock at the chaplaincy door. A large man in a prison-issue grey jumper pokes his head into the room.

'I've tried drugs, and they've not worked. I've tried sex, and it wasn't fulfilling. I've had a good go at alcohol,' he says. 'What do you have to offer me?'

Chaplain Revd Tim Wright smiles. He's been the prison chaplain here for eight years and has had countless similar encounters. 'Come in and let's talk,' says Tim.

Within weeks, the prisoner committed his life to Jesus, became a regular at Bible studies, and was planning his release with a Christian mentoring scheme.

That's just one of the remarkable stories coming out of the 80 prisons we work with across England and Wales. Prisoners are turning to Jesus in huge numbers – and your support is fuelling faith.

Growing numbers

There are more than 85,000 prisoners in England and Wales, and the prison population is increasing. Prisoners are getting older (17 per cent are over 50), the vast majority are men (some 96 per cent), and sentences are longer (more than half of sentences are now at least four years)¹.

Ever since our founding, Bible Society has supported prison ministry. But in recent years, you've not only provided Bibles, you've also helped prisoners understand God's word through *The Bible Course*, a small group resource which explores the big story of Scripture.

A bespoke series of Gospel booklets for prisoners is in production too. Your support has already helped to print Matthew: A Message of Mercy and Luke/Acts: A Message of Rescue. Booklets on Mark and John should be completed this year, with each Gospel accompanied by reflections written by prison chaplains.

Life-changing impact

All this means the Bible is powerfully touching the lives of prisoners. Tim describes a typical session of *The Bible Course* at HMP Stocken ...

'About 25 men come along, and we break into smaller groups for discussion. The men don't talk about academic ideas, they speak from the heart. They want my humanity to touch theirs,' said Tim. 'There's really nothing else like *The Bible Course*.'

Back when Tim first arrived at HMP Stocken, which is in the county of Rutland in the East Midlands, a handful of men would turn up to Sunday services. Now, more than 70 prisoners cram into the chapel each week. 'Men give their lives to Christ all the time,' said Tim. 'One prisoner recently brought about five other people to faith.'

So why is prison such fertile ground for the gospel? Tim is in no doubt. 'These men are not approaching Christianity as a hobby,' he said. 'They are desperate for change.'

He added, 'A third of prisoners have grown up in care, and many have never been loved. They seek relationship, and when they hear the Bible's story of salvation – of God's faithful hand on his people – that has a big effect.'

Amazing opportunity

For you and other Bible Society supporters, the prison ministry presents an amazing opportunity to share God's word. In 2024, the aim is to distribute more Bibles, and reach more prisoners with *The Bible Course*.

Harry Fenner Crawley, Bible Society's Community Engagement Manager, says, 'We know that when we visit someone in prison, we visit Jesus himself (Matthew 25.36–40). This work is close to God's heart. Giving a Bible to a prisoner may not always be a quick fix, but it is life-changing.'

Peacemakers in the Middle East

Three teams sharing Jesus in divided communities

Months after the shocking attack on Israel and the devastating retaliation in Gaza, Bible Society's three teams go on serving their communities. With your support they've been meeting urgent needs since the fighting broke out, providing for people who have been injured, bereaved and made homeless. They're bringing Scripture to all communities, revealing the God of peace who brings a new way to live.

Believing in the resurrection in Gaza

Nashat Filmon leads the Bible Society team working among Palestinians

Your generous donations have been providing the Bible to Palestinian people long before this latest outbreak of violence. Nashat's team have intensified their work in Gaza and the West Bank, experiencing the chaos as part of the Palestinian community but sharing a powerful message of healing.

'We've formed a crisis team,' Nashat said back in October. 'We are in daily contact with local and church leaders in the Gaza Strip and have maintained an open line of communication with them. We're trying to provide as much help as possible.'

The team gave out food and blankets to sheltering Christian families, and they've lived through the war with them.

Nashat told us that members of his team had been injured in the bombing and lost their homes.

The two Bible Society offices in Gaza were hit by airstrikes.

'As we go through the Via Dolorosa,' Nashat said, 'through the hardships, we look forward to the resurrection. We'll continue to be a living testimony and stand with the body of Christ and the Church during this tough time.'

A testimony of unity

Victor Kalisher leads Bible Society in Israel

Victor, a Jewish follower of Jesus, leads Bible Society in Israel, sharing Scripture throughout the country. He and his team, based in Jerusalem, serve Israel's Hebrew-speaking majority as well as various minority groups. Now, in this crisis, they're providing scriptures and support to people traumatised by the Hamas attack and the resulting war.

They aim to provide a testimony to the love of Christ. They're fostering unity among believers from different backgrounds, joining and leading gatherings for prayer and support. Victor works closely with Nashat and Dina, who lead the other



Bible Society teams. 'We have a testimony of unity in our ministry,' says Victor.

The team in Israel has been reaching in all directions with Scripture resources. They've given pocket Bibles to soldiers and produced a special edition

of the Psalms for Jews with passages about the Messiah highlighted. They also serve Israel's migrant workers, sharing God's word in a great range of translations.

Feeling the pain of both peoples

Dina Katanacho leads the Arab-Israeli Bible Society

Dina is based in Nazareth and with your help she's sharing the Bible among her own Arab-Israeli community. 'We carry the burden of both peoples' pain,' she said. 'Our aim is to build a community of forgivers and peacemakers. We seek to combat darkness through the principles of the Kingdom of God.'

Dina's team are sharing the spiritual tools with which Christians can bring healing, reconciliation, love and hope. They have a powerful digital outreach, encouraging people to seek God in the worst situations. And in schools, their already-effective antibullying programme has gained new significance as they steer the next generation away from violence.

Kanti's husband walked out on her and their two young daughters in Sri Lanka. She had no means to provide for the children, so she packed up what little she had and headed to the Gulf with her daughters to look for work.

She was just one of countless desperately poor women who arrive in the Gulf from the Indian subcontinent in the hope of making a living as a housemaid. Many who arrive find themselves in a dreadful environment, working long hours for poor pay, and being housed in camps separated from regular society. The Guardian recently reported

that women were held captive and traded online in one Gulf state.

Angry with everyone

'When I arrived in Bahrain, I was broken on the inside and hardened in my heart due to what life had brought upon me. I used to be angry with everyone all the time,' says Kanti.

But then a Christian friend invited her to one of the churches in Bahrain that is supported by Bible Society in the Gulf.

'God spoke to my heart during that very first visit to the church. I could feel a strong call for repentance which I obeyed. I came out from the church service that day as a completely new person on the inside,' Kanti says.

Jesus was my anchor

'God helped me to take care of my daughters, send them to school and see them become mothers themselves. I could not have done all that by myself.

Jesus Christ was my beacon and anchor. He gave me the strength to persevere, survive and triumph. I came broken to Bahrain, but God made me whole.'

Ninety per cent of many church congregations in Bahrain are made up of housemaids, while the other ten per cent are mostly made up of other migrant workers

such as drivers, construction labourers and cleaners.

Kanti is now just like her friend all those years ago who led her to church for the first time. She testifies to others within the large Sri Lankan migrantworker community in Bahrain, introducing them to the Scriptures where they can find hope through Jesus. And when they go to the church they are given Scriptures in their own language, which you help to provide by supporting Bible work in the Gulf.

'I am committed to sharing my story with fellow housemaids because I want them to see the light and find the peace that only Jesus Christ can give,' she says.


Thank you for free Bibles

We introduced *The Romans Course* to you in last summer's edition of *Word in Action* in an interview with its creator, Andrew Ollerton.

Here we delve deeper into the course to see what some of you think of this long-awaited follow-up to *The Bible Course*.

We visited a church in Swindon and heard from a house group in Bristol about how they are getting on with *The Romans Course*.

With video teaching set against the stunning backdrop of Rome and a helpful discussion guide for participants, this ten-session course will take your group on a journey to explore the most influential letter ever written.

The house group (in Keynsham, Bristol)

'The Romans Course is interesting, stimulating and challenging. We find difficult issues put across clearly and Andrew Ollerton's use of simple examples is very helpful. I thoroughly recommend this course,' said Penny Garrett, who wrote in to tell us about her house group's experience of using the course (also see Penny's 'One verse' on Page 15).

A group of ten meet, ranging in age from late 50s to Penny, who is the eldest at 80.

Leadership of the sessions has been shared within the group.

Graham Shaw, one of the group, said, 'I found the course particularly helpful in helping me to appreciate the link between Paul's theological outlook (chapters 1–11), and his down-to-earth practical guidance for living the Christian life (chapters 12–16).



'I found the emphasis on the assurance of God's ongoing and unconditional love despite my continued failings wonderfully helpful. If one objective of this course has been to increase the confidence of Christians in our faith, then for me it has succeeded.

'The presentation and production standards of *The Romans Course* are the best I have ever come across for a Bible study series. Setting the scene for the book in its historical context (including presenting

the course from Rome itself) enabled me to understand so much more clearly the issues and pressures which early Christians in Rome faced.

After the ninth session, Penny said, 'Everyone is feeling very positive and we will feel sad when we come to the end! I hope another book is done in the future.'

members of the group thinking
more than you'd expect. They
really take it in and bring it to
other conversations.

How has the course given you a deeper understanding of the themes in Romans?

One of those themes is sin. Other places in the Bible connect sin and shame and inequity. But Romans tells us we don't need to identify with our sins. It's the difference between guilt and shame. Guilt is 'I've done something wrong' but shame is 'I am wrong' and Romans shows us that God doesn't want us to be ashamed. Just know when we have done something wrong.

Especially Romans 7.15 where Paul says, 'What I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do' (NIV) and it teaches us that just knowing when you have done something wrong is a step in the right direction.

Was there anything you specifically wanted to get out of the course?

Yes, scriptural enlightenment and empowerment. It has given me confidence in sharing and talking about this book but also the Bible in general.

One verse

Penny is doing *The Romans*Course with her house group
(see pages 12–13). We stretched
her 'One verse' into two!

For I am certain that nothing can separate us from his love: neither death nor life, neither angels nor other heavenly rulers or powers, neither the present nor the future, neither the world above nor the world below — there is nothing in all creation that will ever be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8.38–39, GNB)

My dad was a priest and my own journey has been very much centred on a loving relationship with God. As a trained therapist (from a nursing background) my strength in that work and in my Christian journey has been from a 'feeling' perspective rather than a 'thinking' one. So, some of the book of Romans was difficult, partly from a language point

of view (I have mild dyslexia). However, certain verses are my favourite, especially Romans 8.38–39.

My late husband and I worked as mission partners in Nigeria with Church Mission Society for five years in the early 1970s. Despite ups and downs such as when my husband died soon after retiring as a GP, I felt very powerfully God's love and assurance. I recall thinking that any of my family or friends can die but God will always be with me.

As an 80 year old, I let the younger ones deal with the technology (with *The Romans Course*) but I do lead at other times!
